Bagman's Musings

Please accept my apologies for the delayed distribution of this Newsletter - originally because of a lack of content but more recently due to a variety of other pressures on my time. In the interim I have tried to keep people up-to-date via emails and the Google Group site.

Of key importance now are the arrangements for the ARM, including booking accommodation and candidates for the various posts due for election, and Subs Renewal. This information has been circulated electronically to ensure notice deadlines have been met. (6 months' notice of the date of the ARM and 3 months for nominations for Officers and Elected Members of the Advisory Council, proposed alterations to the Constitution and formal resolutions for discussion at the ARM.)

It is hoped that this popular, informative and enjoyable weekend will be rescheduled. Cromford Venture Centre, in the heart of the Derbyshire Peak District, with Ripley Morris Men as hosts promised to be a grand weekend. Watch this space for information about new date.

An Advisory Council Meeting was held on the Sunday of the annual 18-30s Weekend. This year they had 40+ attendees and having spent the Friday evening practicing an appropriate repertoire delighted the crowds in Oxford on

The opportunity to renew many old acquaintances, and mourn the absence of others, was great as was making new ones from across all three Morris Organisations. In addition on Sunday morning Roy Dommett, who has made a staggering contribution to the preservation and development of the Morris, regaled us with words of wisdom about the philosophy and practicalities of being 'Morris Characters' based on his many years of experience.

Elections As I reminded everyone in the last Newsletter, at our 2012 ARM



we will be electing a new Squire and a new Treasurer. Peter's term of office will be over and Eddie has intimated that he does not wish to stand for re-election.

For both posts the Constitution requires a biographical statement⁽¹⁾ (250 word max.) and photograph of the

candidate, and a supporting statement⁽²⁾ of no more than 250 words, to be submitted by the nominating club.

(1) The nature and content of this Pen portrait / Short Biographical sketch is up to the individual candidate. They usually contain some general information about the candidate's life and Morris history' and it has been suggested that it

would be helpful if candidates were to give some indication as to their general philosophy regarding the Morris and more particularly the Morris Ring.

(2) The supporting statement should be submitted on the club's headed paper. Any additional supporting statements received from other sources will not be published.

Area Reps It was obvious from the replies to Brian Tasker's questionnaire whilst he was Squire (summary published in April 2010) that there is a degree of confusion as to exactly what the role of the Area Reps might be. Our Constitution states that they and other members of the Advisory Council exist "to advise and assist the Squire and the other elected officers to further the objects of the Morris Ring" but it does not spell out how they are to glean the information from the sides they represent to enable them to fulfil this function. Whilst he was Squire, Gerald Willey produced a list of suggestions and at the request of Peter Halfpenney, Robin Springett, SW & W Area Rep, refined these for consideration by the Squire.

This is not intended to be read as a 'Job Description', more a set of guidelines to inform both sides and potential candidates for the role. Each area, and every candidate, is different and will require and have to offer different challenges and skills.

- Set up and maintain telephone and email contact with all sides in the area.
- Obtain a programme of events from all sides in the area for reference and to know what is going on.
- Relay to other sides in the area, and also to the Morris Ring Officers any interesting developments, successes, awards, funding, opportunities, deaths, etc., in the area
- Visit as many sides in the area as possible to make contacts and exchange views.
- Encourage associate sides in the area to progress to full membership.
- Promote inter-relationships between all sides in the area, including members
 of the Morris Federation and the Open Morris, e.g. act as a catalyst to
 arrange/organise instructionals and days of dance.

- Act as the "eyes and ears" of the Squire and provide a link between the sides and the Morris Ring officers.
- Attend the ARM and present a report of activities in the area during the past twelve months.
- Attend meetings of the Advisory Council.
- Seek maximum coverage in the media of any noteworthy event by any side in the area.
- · Offer all possible assistance to sides experiencing a crisis of numbers.

Morris Ring Youth Fund This ring-fenced tranche of monies was inspired by Brian Tasker whilst he was Squire of the Morris Ring and generous support from our membership has led to an accumulation to date of some £800. The primary intention of his initiative was to make available some financial support to help kick-start newly formed 'youth' sides. Unfortunately no payments have been made as neither of the applications received matched the criteria set down.

The Officers are keen to put this fund to good use but feel that the definition of purpose has proved too restrictive. Taking advice from the Advisory Council, we have decided to broaden applications for funding to include any projects where the emphasis is on encouraging younger people to join existing Morris Ring sides. The subs renewal form will include an opportunity to

contribute to the fund and sides are encouraged to come forward with qualifying recruitment projects which will make good use of the present fund and future contributions.

All applications will be assessed by the MR Officers whose decision will be final.

White Horse Morris Men I have to again report the loss of a side to the



Ring. This time there is not demise of an associate, but the sad loss of a long standing Ring side. I refer to White Horse Morris Men who were formed in the winter of 1950/51 and were originally based in the Warminster, Wiltshire area. In 1951 they attended their first ring meeting at Oxford and

were admitted to the Morris Ring. Over the years

White Horse Morris Men developed a reputation as an excellent dance side offering dances from a range of mainly Cotswold traditions. They have toured extensively in the United Kingdom, for example to the Isle of Wight, Cheshire, Devon and Oxfordshire as well as in Europe, notably to France and Germany. They have had a hand in the formation of several other sides, Chalice and Mendip spring to mind. Over recent years numbers have fluctuated and the age of the side has increased so in September 2011 they was decided

to make the side mixed, with the mixed dances concentrating on mainly Border Dances, but also providing the opportunity to carry on the long tradition of Cotswold Dances, usually with an all male side. Their numbers are now flourishing and the style and energy that has always characterised White Horse has been maintained for the continuance of Morris Dancing in the Vale of The White Horse.

Sad losses

John Maher long-time member of and Horse for Bristol MM as well as the Morris Ring Webmaster and Overseas Bagman. The huge attendance of members of the whole Morris community at his cremation and afterwards at The Dovecote, Long Ashton illustrate the high esteem in which he was held. John saw no divisions within the Morris.

Peter Thomas, dancer with White Horse Morris Men for some years, former squire of East Kent Morris Men and lately of Headcorn Morris, died on the afternoon of Sunday 16 October in the Ashford Pilgrim's Hospice. He is finally at peace and out of pain after a twelve year battle with colon cancer. For the last three years he has been in almost constant pain or discomfort, but has stayed strong, courageous and dignified throughout, encouraging others to face the fear and get themselves checked out. A cousin described him as a gentleman and a gentle man.

Norris 'Win' Winstone of Kemps Men of Norwich. Win had turned 98 in March. "A measure of the man was his infinite patience and his conviction that people are full of kindness when given the chance to show it. A measure of the regard in which he was held were the scores of dancers and musicians that travelled across the country to Norwich to join in his 95th birthday celebrations in 2008 - an event that totally overwhelmed him and the topic of frequent conversations since."

Schedule One of the Licensing Act 2003. The UK Government is undertaking a consultation exercise to possibly deregulate many of the activities covered by the Licensing Act 2003 in England and Wales. Currently Schedule One of the Licensing Act 2003 - exempts Morris dancing. (The document is 42 pages long and can be obtained from DCMS.) A couple of sections apply to us in the Morris world:

- Folk plays are currently regulated by the Act, whereas morris dancing is
 exempt. This is an opportunity for mummers and guisers, etc to influence
 the politicians to obtain exemption for folk plays too. Mumming is
 currently seen as drama and as such really requires a licence even though it
 is very often performed as part of a Morris performance.
- Where sides use amplified instruments strictly speaking they currently require a licence. Our exemption clearly states un-amplified music.

When the Bill and Act was going through Parliament we hit a brick wall with regard to Mumming and small scale amplification of instruments so this Consultation period (up to 3/12) gives us the opportunity to say our piece - and perhaps change something.

STANDON: The village Morris side has appointed its youngest ever squire.

Lewis Ffitch, of Coldsfoot Road, Ware, was elected squire of the Standon Morris Men at the side's annual meeting, and will have responsibility for deciding the structure of the side and what dances are performed.

At 17 years and 7 months, Lewis takes the title from his brother Eddy, who was the former squire and was nearly 18 upon his appointment.

Lewis said: "I'm looking forward to the duties involved and hope I can do as good a job as Eddy.

"This year is an important year for Standon as we are very low

Practice in Standon Village Hall takes place from 8.15pm to 10pm on most Thursday evenings from October.






Bath International Mummers Unconvention

331st Cotswold Olimpicks Meeting

Cost £85 250 max

Come to Chipping Campden in the Olympic year to celebrate the roots of the Olympic movement, a true people's games.

2012 sees the 400th running of Dover's Games, also known as the 'Cotswold

Olimpicks'. Dover's Games were referred to in the British Olympic Committee's bid to host the games as the "first stirring of Britain's Olympic beginnings". The games will be held on 1st June 2012.

The meeting will follow the traditional format -

- informal on Friday evening, giving visitors the opportunity to enjoy the delights of the town
- tours in the Cotswolds on Saturday (all tours will include at least one traditional village), followed by a massed display in Chipping Campden and a feast
- Sunday procession through the town to Parish Church of St James (a Wool Church) and a further massed display, followed by lunch and a fond farewell The meeting is based at the town's academy school.
