Lads a Bunchum (Adderbury)



#### Sticks - Ellie Duncan

I'm a woodland owner and member of a local coppicing group as well as a Morris dancer and musician. I'd like to draw your attention to the Regional Coppice Federation reps who can put you in touch with coppice workers/owners who are ideally placed to provide good quality Morris sticks. This is the ideal time of year to strike up a lasting relationship as coppicing is done before nesting season and takes advantage of rapid spring growth for regeneration.

Coppicing is very good for biodiversity so by getting your sticks from a coppicer you are helping to keep a longstanding woodland management community alive. They don't charge much for their products and some are happy to barter. For example, we've just exchanged a case of cider provided by one of our side members for 40 long hazel sticks. ### **Uttoxeter Morris: Notes on New Member Recruitment**

It seems that whenever two or more Morris sides get together the conversation will quickly turn to "how are you managing recruitment". When I joined the Uttoxeter Heart of Oak Morris in 2006 I looked around and I was not surprised to see that nearly everybody in the group had achieved six score years and all were male (I was later to learn that many were founder members from 1954). I was an easy recruit, I fancied doing Morris dancing and looked up the nearest Morris side on The Ring website. From that time (and before) there have been many attempts to recruit members, they were mostly unsuccessful. What follows is some reflection on both the failed attempts and recent successes of these activities.

From the point of my joining the Side the number of dancers slowly dwindled as the march of time naturally meant that aging bodies were no longer able to strut their stuff. The Side struggled along and the number of events we were able to attend also decreased. A low point was reached in 2022 when we were only able to dance at twenty events (in comparison to fifty in 2024). This was the point where we formalized the arrangement with our friends from Stafford Morris, we had tried to help each other up to this point informally, but recognised that it was necessary to have a joint dance schedule for the year (we shared a single page on MorrisBook). Indeed it was doubtful that we could have managed a single event on our own during that time. Recruitment was often discussed, especially at AGMs, and this led to ad hoc recruitment attempts. Adverts and articles in local papers were tried in conjunction with 'open' practice nights. We handed out flyers at events. Prior to The Ring decision to admit women members we made the move to encourage women members to join. This led to an all female side dancing in parallel with the men. Some of those female members eventually made the transition to the full side. Also at this time a very young member called Sam attended our practice nights, and due to his age his parents had to attend at the same time. Little did we know what a difference he would make in years to come!

In 2022 a small group of the old guard (myself included) did the 'traditional' thing and applied for a "We love Uttoxeter" grant from the Staffordshire Community Organisation to mount a programme to attract new members. Our plan was to contact local organisations and offer a presentation and dance demonstration in order to generate recruits. We were able to use the 'Community' data base and found about 70 organisations, from the Girl Guides to the Lions and from local doctors' surgeries to allotment holders, to offer our services. We worked up a PowerPoint presentation and had rehearsals of our show. We invested the grant money into a projector and portable loud speaker system. We sent out emails with flyers to each of the selected groups with an invitation to join us, or for us to join a meeting that they could organize internally. We only got two positive responses. The sum total of recruits was nil.

At about this time we were conscious that our friends at Stafford were having great success in recruiting, mainly female members, as their young Squire - Max Haynes — along with Andy Chell, used their considerable skills in social media to create a buzz on the newly fangled (to us) internet. The learning points that we gained from Stafford:

- be consistent Stafford posted every Monday, "Stafford Morris is practicing tonight! Come along here's the time and place."
- better traction is achieved by using reels/short videos rather than static pictures
- be committed share updates across other Facebook groups, ask members to re-share
- regular posting makes all the difference

I think our Squire 'elect' (that young recruit I mentioned earlier) – Sam Egerton - was motivated by this and went into action. In no time at all he mounted our social media campaign and contacted the BBC local radio to start promoting Uttoxeter Morris. That initiative got the TV stations interested which led to both the BBC and ITV featuring us during the prime time evening news spots. Sam's main themes were:

- a) that the long tradition of Morris dancing in Uttoxeter would soon die if we could not recruit new dancers/musicians to join us, and
- b) to emphasize that we were an 'all inclusive' group and that everybody was welcome.

To these ends Sam ensured that our oldest dancing member, eighty seven years young (a founder member of the side in 1956) and several female members were featured (again supported by Stafford Morris), with active joyful Morris dancing going on in the background.

What followed was an avalanche of new (mostly female) faces turning up at our practice sessions. We also realized that attracting new people was only the start; if the initial contact and interaction was not positive then those attracted would only turn up once and would be lost. A plan developed to do the following:

- we must be warm and welcoming
- we prepared a simple name badge system that could be repeated at each session so that all those who attended could refer to each other by name
- we wanted the dancing to be 'fun' so we would not worry about too much detail e.g. correct 'stepping' was less important that learning the sequence of moves in the dance. The detail could follow later ...
- we would teach only the 'simple' dances at the start and build slowly (the stick dances seemed to go down well with many new recruits)
- for people new to dancing the effort and physical strain would be hard at the start ... they could do as little or as much as they liked
- no 'subs' would be payable for the first year ... ("we want to ensure that this new hobby is right for you before you commit")
- for those who continued to attend practices we would help them to prepare the 'uniform' ready for the dancing season (e.g. the Side ordered and paid for a set of bells for every member)

Sam's enthusiasm and teaching propelled us forward in all these endeavours and he was massively supported by Max Hayes and Andy Chell (from Stafford Morris), they implemented these themes and created a fantastic atmosphere to both learn and have fun with Morris.

We have gone from a Side that struggled to put out a set of six, to one where we regularly have twenty plus attending practices and events on a regular basis. On the musicians side we have additional melodeon, fiddle and banjo players. More important than the sheer numbers is the change in atmosphere about the Club. In discussion with many of the 'old hands', we all agree that the new members have brought a new energy and sense of fun to each and every occasion. This has introduced new life and made each gig something that nobody wants to miss. What a difference to the days when we could not even put out a full side without some arm twisting. Huge thanks all our new members – both dancers and musicians!

Well that is the view from an aging white male from the 'old guard'. To show some balance I thought it would be instructive to collect some views of those on the receiving end ... some comments and

observations from the new starts who attended those first few crowded practice nights and decided to stay with us:

"At my first practice night I was unsure what to expect as this had been a male Morris side in the past. However, touched by Sam's personal invitation to join the side, and greatly inspired by his passion for the Morris, energy, enthusiasm, and his vision for the future of Uttoxeter Morris as an inclusive, welcoming and thriving local Morris side, encouraged by Kirsty and Andy, and inspired by Stafford Morris, this is what brought me to the side. I decided to stay with the side because from the very outset I was welcomed by the squire, Kirsty and Andy, the committee and our friends in Stafford Morris. I also now play the Melodeon for the side. I am proud to be a member of this friendly, welcoming, inclusive, supportive, diverse and thriving local community of Cotswold Morris dancers and musicians, fulfilling my lifelong ambition to dance traditional Cotswold Morris. It is an honour to be upholding this most ancient of English traditions and to be a part of keeping it alive for future generations."

"I don't know what made me go along to my first practice, I really don't. The first practice was so hard. I am disabled & chronically ill, & it really knocked me for six. The wonderful Kirsty Higgs messaged me, saying it had gone rough for her too, and perhaps we should stretch before we start. This just instantly made me feel better, and not alone in my knackered-ness. The second time I attended pratice I actually brought 3 new members with me; my husband Al, who had Morris danced as a child, my son Harper, 17 at the time, & one of my closest friends, Caroline, who, like me, is just a little mad. I persevered through many injuries, using miles of support bandage & pain meds. Though my dancing is much more on par with the 80 year olds in the group, I'm still a valued member of the team. Going to that first pratice totally on a whim has impacted my life so massively & so positively it's a little unreal. I still struggle physically, but everything I'm doing will hopefully slow my deterioration & if nothing else, I'm having an amazing time. (Oh I also crocheted 26 bespoke-to-each-member dolls & their respective instruments etc. because I felt like it)."

"I joined Uttoxeter Morris in 2008 aged 10, after my mum bought me a toy accordion, but started off learning to dance. I instantly took a shine to it, and by the age of 17, I had become the youngest Squire in the country, and an accomplished musician for the side. Having danced all around the country, occasionally turning up to dance with other teams too, Morris dancing soon took a massive place in my heart. Seeing the decline of my "home-side" Uttoxeter Heart of Oak Morris, I accepted the role of Squire again in October 2023, along with the foreman job I took on in 2022 with the aim to save the side. After a mad media rush and a very busy year of practicing, along with 50 events, 2024 was the most successful year in the history of Uttoxeter Heart of Oak, and I am proud of every member old and new for their commitment and dedication in preserving this fantastic ancient tradition we all love".
